International expeditions and field schools have been an integral part of the curriculum in Adventure Studies since its founding at TRU in 1992.


Expedition courses serve as a capstone for the two-year Adventure Guide Diploma and can be domestic or internationally located. Students collaborate with faculty to plan and execute these journeys which are focused on one of the following adventure sports: white water rafting and kayaking, ski touring, sea kayaking, surfing, or rock climbing.

International expeditions have taken place in the United States, Mexico, Belize, Nicaragua, Ecuador, Peru, Chile, Iceland, France, Nepal, and Tibet.

Pedagogy

Teaching and learning through international expeditions is a process of engaging students in addressing real world challenges in authentic environments.

On Adventure Studies expeditions students take the lead on both the planning and field-experience. Instructors serve primarily as mentors during this capstone experience. Students apply their technical, leadership, and planning skills both during the pre-expedition planning at TRU and while on expedition.

Our faculty consists of accomplished professionals who are not only respected academics but also highly skilled technicians in their respective fields. This rare combination allows us to offer a curriculum that blends theory and practice, providing our students with a comprehensive understanding of the adventure tourism industry.

Expedition Planning

In preparation for their capstone expeditions in May, all secondyear Adventure Studies students complete *ADVG 2830 International Expedition Planning & Leadership* in the fall semester.

This course is concerned with the planning and leadership of complex, remote, multi-week and/or international adventure expeditions.

Aspects of expedition planning include identification and research of previous expeditions; planning timelines and implementation; logistics and scheduling; permit acquisition; sponsorship; socio-political considerations; leadership; training; legal implications; risk management; food and equipment acquisitions; cargo shipping; and local ground handling. Topics include examining and minimizing the cultural impact of expeditions, cultural considerations of foreign guiding, stewardship and global citizenship.
